CAMERAS IN THE COURTROOM PILOT PROJECT

The District of Massachusetts is among fourteen district courts participating in the digital video pilot of the Federal Judiciary. This pilot project allows a limited exception to the ban on cameras in the courtroom and broadcasting of district court proceedings. The three year pilot will evaluate the effect of cameras in the courtroom for civil cases.

Proceedings are recorded with the consent of the parties and the approval of the presiding judge. The presiding judge may stop a recording as necessary, for example, to protect the rights of the parties and witnesses.

Recording of the prospective jury during voir dire is prohibited, as is that of impaneled jurors or alternate jurors.

PACER AND US PARTY/CASE INDEX

WHAT IS PACER?

PACER (**P**ublic **A**ccess to **C**ourt **E**lectronic **R**ecords) is an electronic public access service that allows users to obtain case and docket information from Federal Appellate, District and Bankruptcy Courts, and from the U.S. Party/Case Index. Electronic access is available for most courts by registering with the PACER Service Center, the judiciary's centralized registration, billing, and technical support center at <http://pacer.psc.uscourts.gov>.

WHY USE PACER?

The PACER System offers an inexpensive, fast, and comprehensive case information service to any individual with a personal computer (PC) and Internet access. The PACER system permits you to request information about a particular individual or case. The data is displayed directly on your PC screen within a few seconds. The system is simple enough that little user training or documentation is required.

AVAILABLE INFORMATION

The PACER System offers electronic access to case dockets to retrieve information such as:

- A listing of all parties and participants including judges, attorneys, and trustees;
- A compilation of case related information such as cause of action, nature of suit, and dollar demand;
- A chronology of dates of case events entered in the case record;
- A claims registry;
- A listing of new cases each day;
- Appellate court opinions;
- Judgments or case status;
- Types of documents filed for certain cases; and
- Imaged copies of documents.

U.S. PARTY/CASE INDEX

The U.S. Party/Case Index is a national index for U.S. district, bankruptcy, and appellate courts. A small subset of information from each case will be transferred to the U.S. Party/Case Index each night. The system serves as a locator index for PACER. You may conduct nationwide searches to determine whether or not a party is involved in federal litigation. For detailed information on cases found while searching the U.S. Party/Case Index, you will need to visit the PACER site for the particular jurisdiction where the case is located.

PHOTOGRAPHING, RECORDING AND BROADCASTING

Local Rule 83.3(a) states: “Except as specifically provided in these rules or by order of the court, no person shall take any photograph, make any recording, or make any broadcast by radio, television, or other means, in the course of or in connection with any proceedings in this court, on any floor of any building on which proceedings of this court are or, in the regular course of the business of the court, may be held.”

PRESS ID CARD APPLICATION, INSTRUCTIONS

The non-transferable Media Identification Card provides an exception to the Court’s Policy regarding Electronic Devices. A valid Media Identification Card will entitle an individual to bring to a courtroom a laptop with a silent keyboard and/or a cell phone that must be off or in silent mode while in a courtroom. All Media Identification Cards will be subject to the provisions of Local Rule 83.3 that prohibits photographing, recording and broadcasting.

Instructions and the application are both available on the Court’s website.

PRESS RELEASES

As events warrant, the Clerk of Court, at the direction of the Chief Judge or his designee may issue a press release. Any such release will be distributed to the media via email and posted to the Court’s website.

The Administrative Office of the US Courts also maintains an Office of Public Affairs. The telephone number for that office is 202-502-2600.

PRIVACY INFORMATION (E-GOVERNMENT ACT)

On December 17, 2002, President Bush signed into law the “E-Government Act of 2002,” Pub. L. No. 107-347.

In compliance with Local Rule 5.3, attorneys and *pro se* litigants are not to include sensitive information in any document filed with the Court unless such inclusion is necessary and relevant to the case.

Counsel may be directed to file a redacted version electronically, and a complete document in hard copy.

SPECIAL ORDERS FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE ACCUSED OR THE LITIGANTS IN WIDELY PUBLICIZED OR SENSATIONAL CRIMINAL OR CIVIL CASES

Local Rule 83.2B states: “In a widely publicized or sensational criminal or civil case, the court, on motion of either party or on its own motion, may issue a special order governing such matters as extrajudicial statements by parties and witnesses likely to interfere with the rights of the accused or the litigants to a fair trial by an impartial jury, the seating and conduct in the courtroom of spectators and news media representatives, the management and sequestration of jurors and witnesses, and any other matters which the court may deem appropriate for inclusion in such an order.”

Any orders issued by the Court regarding such matters will be posted on the Court’s website as soon as possible and made available in the Clerk’s Office.

VIRTUAL PRESS BOX

The United States District Court for the District of Massachusetts can issue read-only Electronic Case Filing (ECF) accounts (to be known as a Virtual Press Box or VPB) to members of the press with a Media ID issued by this court. This expanded access to the court’s ECF system enables a reporter to receive e-mail notifications to their individual e-mail account when a document is filed in a case that he or she may choose to follow.
